Plants used by the Potawatomi and Winnebago (Hočąk) in the 1800's

Medical Terms used in Ethnobotany

Adjuvant- a pharmacological or immunological agent that modifies the effect of other agents.

Alterative- A treatment or medication that restores health.

Anthelmintic- Antiparasitic medicine that stuns or kills parasitic worms and other internal parasites.

Astringent: A substance that contracts living tissue.

Ague- a fever (such as malaria) marked by outbreaks of chills, fever, and sweating that recur at regular intervals.

Cathartic- A cathartic is an agent for purging the bowels.

Compress: A piece of linen or other cloth soaked in an herbal infusion or decoction and applied externally.

Cordial: A warm and reviving drink. The term is also applied to a medicine that stimulates the heart.

Decoction: Water in which a substance has been boiled and contains the constituents of the substance in it. A standard decoction is made with 1 ounce of herb to 2 1/2 cups of water.

Diuretic: Any substance which, when consumed, increases the volume of the flow of urine.

Emetic: A substance, that when consumed, causes vomiting. Used to get harmful substances out of the body.

Emollient: A softening substance.

Expectorant: A substance that encourages phlegm to be coughed out of the lungs.

Glycerin: A syrupy liquid obtained from oils and fats that is used as a solvent, preservative, and stabilizer in making tinctures.

Febrifuge- substances that reduce fever.

Hemostatic- substance that stops bleeding.

Infusion: A tea of water and a substance which has been prepared by pouring boiling water over the plant, and which has been allowed to sit a few minutes. For a standard infusion, use 1 ounce of herb to 2 1/2 cups of water. To make a mild infusion, half the quantity of the herb; for a strong infusion, double the quantity of the herb.

Physic- A medicine or drug, especially a cathartic. A cathartic is an agent for purging the bowels.

Poultice: A mass of cloth, bread, meal, herbs, etc., applied externally as a hot or warm application on a body part.

Purgative: A strong laxative taken to empty the bowels.

Rootstock: The crown and root system of herbaceous perennials and suckering shrubs.

Salve: A soothing ointment.

Stomachic- promotes appetite and assists digestion.

Tincture: A solution of extracts of medicinal plants obtained by steeping the plants in alcohol or glycerine.

Wash: A strong decoction or tea, usually cooled, which is applied to an injury, using a clean washcloth, which may be repeatedly wrung out and reapplied.

Acer saccharum Marsh. Sugar Maple	Drug, Expectorant Inner bark used as an expectorant.
Acer saccharum Marsh. Sugar Maple	Food, Beverage Maple sap, as it came from the tree, drunk by children.
Acer saccharum Marsh. Sugar Maple	Food, Candy Children made taffy by cooling the maple sap in the snow.
Acer saccharum Marsh. Sugar Maple	Food Maple sap not only furnished the sugar for seasoning material but also furnished the vinegar. Sap that was allowed to become sour made a vinegar to be used in cooking venison which was afterwards sweetened with maple sugar. This corresponds somewhat to the German 'sweet and sour' style of cooking.
Acer saccharum Marsh. Sugar Maple	Food, Sweetener Maple sugar used, instead of salt, to season all cooking. The sugar maple and the black sugar maple are found all over Illinois and were considered to be the most valuable trees in the forest because they furnished them their seasoning material.

Achillea millefolium L. Common Yarrow	Drug An infusion of the leaves used as a wash for swelling. Wad of leaves or infusion put into ear for earache.
Acorus calamus L. Calamus	Drug, Antihemorrhagic Compound decoction of small amount of root taken for hemorrhage. Dangerous unless a correct dosage is used. (Introduced).
Acorus calamus L. Calamus	Other, repellent Spray a tea made with leaves and roots around a tent when camping to keep out spiders and snakes Dangerous. Do not ingest or breathe in spray. Wash hands after using. (Introduced).
Acorus calamus L. Calamus	Drug, Respiratory Aid Powdered root snuffed up nose for catarrh. Dangerous unless a correct dosage is used. (Introduced).
Actaea rubra (Ait.) Willd. Red Baneberry	Drug, Gynecological Aid Infusion of root given 'to purge the patient of afterbirth.'
Adiantum pedatum L. Northern Maidenhair Fern	Drug, Gynecological Aid Infusion of root taken by nursing mothers for caked breast.
Adiantum pedatum L. Northern Maidenhair Fern	Good Luck Charm Black stems used as hunting charms to bring good luck.
Ageratina altissima (L) King & H.E. Robins. White Snakeroot	Drug, Snakebite The root is macerated and used to poultice a rattlesnake bite and cure it. The bite won't swell.
Agrimonia gryposepala Wallr. Tall Hairy Agrimony	Drug, Hemostat Plant used as styptic and infusion snuffed for nosebleed.
Allium canadense L. Wild onion	Food Very strong flavor, a valuable wild food, used in soup. Hočąk used the fresh bulbs as a relish and also ate the bulbs fried.

Aralia racemosa L. American Spikenard	Drug, Dermatological Aid Hot poultice of pounded root applied to inflammations. The root is boiled for sores, boils and carbuncles.

Arctium minus Bernh. Lesser Burrdock	Drug, Blood Medicine Infusion of root taken as a blood purifier and general tonic. (Introduced).
Arctium minus Bernh. Lesser Burrdock	Drug, Tonic Infusion of root taken as a general tonic and blood purifier. (Introduced).
Arctostaphylos uva-ursi (L.) Spreng. Kinnikinnick, Bearberry	Smoke Plant Leaves mixed with tobacco. Endangered species in Illinois
Arisaema triphyllum (L.) Schott Jack in The Pulpit	Drug Thinly sliced roots cooked in a pit oven for three days to eliminate the poison. The root is then made Into a bitter compound much like a mustard plaster for neuralgia or rheumatism.

Asarum canadense L. Canadian Wildginger	Drug, Antiemetic Root used to help the appetite of persons who could not keep anything in their stomachs. Used to make a tonic tea.
Asarum canadense L. Canadian Wildginger	Food, Spice Root flavored racoon meat or fish and rendered otherwise inedible food, tender and palatable.
Asclepias syriaca L. Common Milkweed	Drug, Unspecified Root used for unspecified ailments.

Asclepias syriaca L. Common Milkweed	Food, Soup Flowers and buds used to thicken meat soups and to impart a very pleasing flavor to the dish.
Asclepias tuberosa L. Butterflyweed	Drug A very great remedy for the Hočąk. The root is chewed and placed in a wound to heal. In case of hemorrhage one should drink it (the root).
Baptisa alba White wild indigo	Drug The root is a single remedy to use for an injured womb alone. Cook the root and mash it to form a poultice to bind on. Change twice a day until healed.

Celastrus scandens L. American Bittersweet	Starvation Food Inner bark cooked in times of food scarcity, not highly commended as a food but valued.

The gum from the pods was used to cure a person of severe mental illness. (Poisonous) Infusion of root used as an enema and infallible remedy for constipation.

Jugulans nigra L. Black walnut	Dye Fruit is picked when green covering is still soft and covering the walnuts.

	The covering is crushed and then the nuts and coverings are soaked in water for a week to remove all the dye.
