Join us January 16, 2014 for our first meeting of the new year, in our new location! Tim Lewis will give an excellent introduction to landscaping using native plants. The presentation explains the history of our ecosystems, how we got to where we are today, and why native plants are vital to the environment.

If you think we're into "natives" just because we like the pretty flowers, you will find that there is a lot more to it than beauty. The benefits and fallacies of natural landscaping will be explained. And finally, Tim will show examples of native plant landscapes to hopefully inspire you to change your thinking about your own landscapes.

Tim Lewis is the national president of Wild Ones Natural Landscapers. He has been on the board of directors for over eight years. Tim was president of the Rock River Valley chapter in Rockford for several years, and served on the board for many more years. He is the past president of the Four Rivers Environmental Coalition.

Tim was named "Conservationist of the Year" for 2009 by the Smississippi Audubon Society. In 2011, he was a finalist for the Seth B. Atwood Memorial Park and Conservation Service Award, and in 2012 was the recipient of this award. With his background in conservation, we are honored to have him in our organization.

He has been growing native plants in his yard since 1991. His beautiful yard contains over 100 species of native plants in prairie plots, rain gardens, and savanna and shade gardens.

Wild Ones moves to Rock Valley College!

Robert Allen Zimmerman (Bob Dylan) tells us that ... "The Times They Are a Changin'". How right you are, Bob! This is a banner year for Wild Ones! The national Wild Ones organization will be observing its 35th Anniversary

in 2014 and ***we will be celebrating our Chapter's 20th Anniversary!***

The national organization of Wild Ones accepted Rock River Valley as a chapter, with 22 members, in July of 1994. We met at Jarrett Prairie Center in Byron offering monthly programs and by 1999 we began publishing an informative newsletter to 97 members. Our numbers grew steadily and by 2002, with 118 members, we moved to Burpee Museum of Natural History, a larger facility.

Our relationship with Burpee Museum of Natural History has been a very positive one. This association with a nationally known scientific based organization has been mutually beneficial. We gained a well regarded, well appointed site for our meetings while introducing our members to a newly expanded and updated Burpee Museum. We did not make the decision to leave lightly.

This year, 2014, the year of our 20th Anniversary, will find us at **Rock Valley College** in the Woodward Technology Center! Our membership hovers around 180 and I want to see us grow beyond the 200 mark! We need a site that will grow with us, providing us with the ability to expand into a larger room when the need arises; up to date audio/visual equipment; better parking for a larger crowd; even more comfortable chairs! Moving to the academic atmosphere of Rock Valley College is the obvious next step for our chapter as we accept the challenge of educating more and more members and community participants about the increasing need to provide native habitat for our stressed ecosystem.

Our time at Burpee Museum of Natural History was fruitful and positive. That prestigious facility served us very well. We watched Burpee grow both in exhibit space and prestige. It has become a nationally recognized scientific institution and we wish them well in their future endeavors. We, now, have moved on to

Rock Valley College and we are on our way up!

Let me make a few more comments regarding change. Constance McCarthy and Lenae Weichel are leaving our Board after serving 9 and 10 years, respectively, in leadership positions. Constance started off as Secretary in 2005 and moved up to President in 2007. She spent 6 years in that position, longer than any former president of our chapter. This last year, as immediate Past President, marks her 9th and final year on our board.

Lenae Weichel began as Newsletter Editor in 2004, moving to Show Me/Help Me Chair and finally Prairie Plant Sale Coordinator. Her insight and editing capabilities made our newsletter one of the best, a tradition Pambi Camacho, our current Newsletter Chair, has built upon. We wish Constance and Lenae the very best and thank them for their dedication, wisdom, and guidance these many years!



The Year in Review Jerry Paulson

At our Chapter's annual pot-luck and seed exchange meeting in November, our Co-Presidents, Bob Arevalo, Ginnie Watson and Treasurer, Janet Giesen, recapped RRV Chapter "Happenings in 2013". Co-President, Bob Arevalo first thanked all the volunteers who put in many hours during the year to make everything happen.

He reported that the year started out with a board retreat to get new ideas and to plan for the activities and programs in 2013. Nine excellent programs were presented, and a special visit to the rooftop garden on Chicago City Hall was a highlight for those who were able to attend. Our popular summer social and garden tour was held at Bobbie Lambiotte's house. Bob thanked Lee and Lynda Johnson for getting the speakers for the excellent programs and planning the tours.


The woodland, prairie and tree and shrub sales were a big success thanks to the work of the coordinators, Barbara Flores, Lenae Weichel, and John Peterson. Tim Lewis had our Wild Ones display booth at six public events this year, including the first ever "Nature Fiesta" sponsored by the Winnebago County Forest Preserve District. Four "Show Me/Help Me" days were held at members yards, planned by Anita Johnson and Mary Ann Mathwich. Bob thanked the coordinators for all their work during the year.

In August Ginnie Watson, Bob Arevalo, Jerry Paulson and Tim Lewis attended the Wild Ones national meeting and planning workshop in Neenah, Wisconsin. They learned about the new Wild Ones website and voted to continue the national "Wild for Monarchs" campaign for another year. Bob shared the new color membership brochure that was developed and printed by the chapter with the other chapters.



Bob thanked Shey Lowman for maintaining the chapter website and other tech matters, and for expanding the merchandise offerings at our monthly meetings. He thanked Jerry Paulson for putting together the monthly e-mail notices, and Marilyn Heneghan for helping to hold the chapter membership steady at 176 members. Our chapter is the third largest out of 48 chapters in the nation, Bob reported.

Janet gave the Chapter financial report for the year. Dues make up about 30% of the Chapter's revenues, she said. Profits from plant sales provide about 50% of yearly income. The costs of speakers, room rental, snacks, etc. for our monthly meetings are the biggest expense, followed by printing and postage for our newsletter, plant sales fliers, and hand-out materials for our display booth. Donations were made to different groups, including the National Wild Ones "Seeds for Education" program.



As the members finished eating their deserts, Ginnie Watson talked about the Chapter's plans for 2014. She said we will continue to work with the "Wild for Monarchs" campaign and promote planting of butterfly refuges for monarchs and other native insects.

Ginnie will also add new books to the library to expand the resources available to members.

Ginnie said that 2014 will be the Chapter's 20th Anniversary, and announced a membership drive to bring in more members. Thanks to a very generous donation from a member, new members who join after January 1st, and participate in 3 Chapter events will be given a free copy of Doug Tallamy's book. Plans are also being made to hold a workshop sometime during the year.

Then Ginnie announced that the monthly Chapter meetings are moving from Burpee Natural History Museum to Woodward Technology Center at Rock

Valley College, starting in January. (See directions to new meeting location.) The new venue is a central and safe location, provides a large meeting room with an audio-visual system, and a large parking lot close to the building with easy access for loading and unloading our library, information display and merchandise. It will also provide us with access to college instructors, students and space for future workshops, conferences and meetings.

Finally, Janaan Lewis, Karen Matz and Ed Foster were each given a \$25 gift card for reporting the most volunteer hours for the year.

Board of Directors in Action

Highlights of activities of the Board of Directors, as discussed at the October 8, 2013 meeting, include the following:

- John Peterson reported the Tree & Shrub sold a total of 147 plants.
- A motion was approved to donate \$2.00 per member to the national Wild Ones Seed for Education grants.
- An anonymous \$500 donation was made to the chapter to recruit new members.
- Plans were initiated for celebrating the chapter's 20th anniversary in 2014. It is also national Wild Ones 35th anniversary.

Highlights of activities of the Board of Directors, as discussed at the December 12, 2013 meeting, include the following:

- The 2014 chapter budget was approved for \$30,900 maintaining all the current board purchasing approvals.
- The contract has been signed with Rock Valley College

A Plant Rescue of a Different Sort Submitted by Barbara Flores

One evening In December of 2012 my husband Frank and I came home to find our nearly 150 year old house on fire. The cause was an 11 year old boiler and it would be more than 10 months before cleaning and restoration were complete and we were back in our home.

Two incredible Wild Ones members learned about what had happened and drove the snowy and cold distance to our house in the country, bringing with them fresh potting soil, tarps, and anything else needed to rescue, not native plants this time, but my beloved houseplants. It was neither easy, nor pleasant, to work in an unheated house, darkened with the smoke which coated every surface, including the foliage and surface soil of every pot. These two ladies, Ginnie Watson and Janet Giesen, set themselves to the task of repotting and cutting back the way too many plants I had and moving them to the nearby farmhouse where we would be living.



2013 Woodland Plant Sale

Barbara Flores Coordinator, Woodland Plant Sale

Our chapter hosted its fifth annual Native Woodland Plant Sale earlier in 2013 which resulted in the addition of 2,080 native plants to the flora of Winnebago and surrounding counties. Of that number, 240 plants were sold at cost to Wild Ones members for various educational projects which had been approved by the board.

This sale, as well as the prairie sale and tree and shrub sale, are an important part of fulfilling the Wild Ones mission to foster the use of native plants. To that end native species which are not readily available locally are offered for sale to members and nonmembers alike. And, of course, the sale is also a fundraiser to help support the fine speaker programs as well as the other educational and outreach activities of the chapter.

For the past two years the woodland plants have been taken to the two day Birdfest event at Sand Bluff Bird Banding Station and this has proved to be a great way to familiarize members of the public with Wild Ones and with native plant species. Many people visited the plant sale area, adjacent to the membership booth, and enjoyed seeing unfamiliar plants as well as learning the names of species they had seen in the wild. Others simply enjoyed talking about the native plants which they have and learning more about the chapter and its activities.

And then another dear Wild Ones member, Anita Johnson, seeing how limited the lighting was to keep all the plants through the winter, stepped in, taking several home with her and enlisting two friends to help give more of my plants a warm, sunny spot until spring.

Among the many tropicals which were saved was a 40 year old *Beaucarnea recurvata*, or pony tail palm, and a more than 60 year old Christmas cactus. Lost, of course, were the ones nearest the fire, but the 100 plus plants which survived, albeit shadows of their earlier selves, are the result of Ginnie's and Janet's efforts. These plants are very familiar and special to me and it is with immense pleasure that I watch them grow. I don't want to replace the ones I lost, not right now – perhaps it is a bit of a period of mourning but mostly to savor caring for the ones Ginnie and Janet saved.

For those new members who may not know, Ginnie is co-president of Wild Ones, Janet is treasurer and Anita is a board member. The RRVC is in great hands.

It is my privilege to coordinate the sale, but there would be no sale without the help of many wonderful volunteers. Chapter members provided ample help throughout the entire sale period from preparing brochures for mailing, to distributing brochures to various locations, making plant signs, picking up the more than 2,300 plants from the grower, unloading same and inserting labels, pulling orders, organizing the plant tables, helping on pickup day, at Birdfest, at the prairie sale and finally at the May meeting. Phew! And to top it off, it is all great fun plus we get to know each other and other members and learn more about native plants in the process.

So thank you so much to all who helped, some for the first time and especially those who have helped over the years: Kathy Crandall, Wendy Dahlberg, Kirby Doyle, Janet Giesen, Don Heneghan, Anita Johnson, Ed Kletecka, Barbara Kober, Barbara Kuminowski, Karen Matz, Cynthia Nelson, John Peterson, Jane Snively, Diane Stenner and Guy Smith. Special thanks to Jane for preparing lovely signs for the more than 40 species offered. And to Jane and Wendy for helping with getting the plants from the grower and especially to Jane's dad, who used his large trailer to supplement my horse trailer, all on a chilly, rainy day.

Volunteers Recognized Shey Lowman

All year we keep track of the number of hours that our hard working volunteers have worked to make our chapter the terrific organization that it is. For every two hours that any member helps at an event, a meeting, preparing a mailing or anything that is needed, their name gets put into a pool for a drawing at the November Potluck. So the more two hour stints a person puts in, the greater their chances are for being selected during the drawing. Three lucky volunteers receive a \$25 gift certificate that can be used toward chapter merchandise

or plant purchases during any of the three annual plant sales.

This year's outstanding volunteers that won the drawing are: Janaan Lewis with 55 hours spent preparing the monthly newsletters for mailing; Karen Matz with 20 hours for volunteering at the meetings and helping with the library; and Ed Foster for his 10 hours setting up the sound system at the monthly meetings. Congratulations to all! And thanks to all of our volunteers who worked nearly 200 hours on the chapter behalf this year!
