
## Native Shrubs and Trees for Birds and Bees Thursday, August 15, 2019

Location: Rock Valley College

Come to this month's program to learn about the rich diversity of woody plants native to the upper Midwest and the benefits of incorporating them into your home landscape to help attract and sustain a diversity of bird and pollinator species.

David Stevens is the curator of Longenecker Horticultural Gardens, the living collection of woody

ornamental plants at the University of Wisconsin-Madison Arboretum. The gardens, begun in 1935, contain the largest and most diverse collection of woody plants in Wisconsin with over 2,500 plant taxa.

David has a Bachelor's degree in horticulture from Virginia Tech and a Master's degree in horticulture from the University of Wisconsin-Madison. With over 33 years' experience in the horticultural field, his work experiences include vegetable production, greenhouse management, botanical garden supervision, and plant breeding.

When not at the Arboretum, he helps run a 130-acre certified organic farm near Baraboo, Wisconsin with his wife Jane, producing specialty herbs, vegetables, grass-fed beef, pastured poultry, and maple syrup.

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## Recap: Wild Ones Potluck and Natural Area Tour

A tasty assortment of appetizers, casseroles, salads, and desserts greeted Wild Ones members at Severson Dells Nature Center for our annual potluck dinner. It was a hot and steamy evening, but that didn't stop members from enjoying each other's company and, of course, food. Many discussions were overheard pertaining to what native flowers were blooming and what sorts of wildlife were attracted to the flora.

After dinner, 15 self-described "brave souls" ioined Severson Dells naturalist Andrea Wallace Noble for a hike through some of the sites on the property. Our first stop was at The Grove, a unique playground that uses natural "equipment" such as a fallen tree where kids are encouraged to be creative and imaginative. Louv's book Last Child in the Woods came to mind as we imagined kids scampering around on the playground, exploring, giggling, getting dirty and scraped up a little bit. This playground also features a popular area where kids (and adults, we learned) can make music using drums, a xylophone, and PVC pipes. But alas, we had more to see.

Andrea took us through the prairie at Severson, showing us where a forestry mower had created smoother transitions between the forest and prairie to help create more rusty patch bumble bee habitat. We observed that parts of the prairie included vast swaths of reed canary grass, which is a never ending battle to eradicate. As the dells are at the headwaters, it is hoped that total eradication can happen in the future.

Along the hike through the prairie, which was created pre-1975, Andrea pointed out the four *Silphium* species, some just starting their summer blooms. We did see a number of bees, including the rusty patch, feeding







on monarda, and managed to watch dragon flies zip around looking for an evening snack. Andrea pointed out some sedges and rushes, proclaiming that "sedges have edges, rushes are round, and grasses are hollow right down to the ground".

Some of the group finished the hike at the greenhouse, which is used to propagate plants for the entire Winnebago County Forest Preserve, and some continued on an "intimate walk through an old pasture" (Jerry Paulson) to see where the forestry mower had helped create more habitat.

It was a warm, sweat-inducing hike, but the mosquitoes were few and the company was good.

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## Spice Up Jour Jard with Some of the New Shrubs and Trees Available from Our Fall Plant Sale

Pick-up dates: Friday and Saturday, Sept. 27 & 28

**Please note**: Unlike the spring plant sale, trees and shrubs may be purchased *only* by advance order; there will not be a wide variety of trees and shrubs for you to browse and purchase on the pick-up days.

Spicebush is just one of several new native shrubs and trees being offered for sale by our chapter this fall to spice up your yard (no pun intended!) and attract more birds and other wildlife. Spicebush (*Lindera benzoin*) is shade tolerant and has a small yellow flower in early spring. The leaves have a very aromatic lemon fragrance and turn an unbelievable yellow color in the fall.

Other new species are:

Pagoda dogwood (*Cornus alternifolia*), a small tree that loves the shade of other trees, with beautiful horizontal branching and white flowers in the spring. Red berries in the fall are a favorite bird food.

Smooth hydrangea (*Hydrangea arborescens*), our only native hydrangea that grows in shade, with white flowers that bloom in early summer.

Shrubby St. Jones Wort (*Hypericum prolificum*) is a small shrub that likes full sun. Bright yellow flowers bloom in July and August.

Wild black currant (*Ribes americanum*) grows only 3 feet tall and does well in shade. The fruit is edible and ripens in July. The leaves turn a very nice red, orange, and deep purple in the fall.

Nannyberry (*Viburnum lentago*) is a favorite shrub for attracting birds, producing abundant fruit in the fall. The large shrub has beautiful white flowers in May, and fabulous maroon-red leaves in the fall. An excellent plant for shrub borders.

Yellow honeysuckle (*Lonicera prolifera*), a low-growing vine. This native honeysuckle features an abundance of red berries in early to mid-summer and green foliage with silver undersides throughout the season. A great ornamental for small spaces.

Yellow birch (*Betula alleghaniensis*) is a small, fast growing, native tree that is an endangered species in Illinois. Its natural habitat is limited to boggy or moist rocky sites in northern Illinois. It needs special care to grow in our climate: moist soil, some shade, and protection from cold winter winds. The trees may need some watering during droughts, so plant close to your house and a hose. The trunk has interesting bark and the leaves turn a lovely yellow in the fall. It you want to try something new, yellow birch is worth planting.

The order forms will be published on the chapter's website and sent to you in a few weeks. **September 20 will be the last day to place orders**. All orders must be placed in advance.

Planting native species is good for the environment; provides habitat for birds, bats, and beneficial insects; reduces temperatures; and creates natural beauty.
