Arthur M. Pearson, author and naturalist, will talk about George B. Fell, the founder of Rockford's Natural Land Institute and a leader in the natural areas preservation movement that spawned many groups like Wild Ones. George Fell was an unlikely hero. Shy, introverted, tenacious to a fault. But in his quiet, deliberate way, this Rockford native protected more natural land in Illinois than anyone before or since. Even more amazingly, he was the driving force behind the founding of The Nature Conservancy,

the Illinois Nature Preserves Commission, and the Natural Areas Association.

Arthur Pearson spent 15 years researching Fell and has chronicled his life and work in an award-winning biography, *Force of Nature: George Fell, Founder of the Natural Areas Movement.* Arthur will guide us through Fell's journey and his own efforts to capture the complexity of the man, as well as his many accomplishments to protect the natural lands we love – especially those in and around the Rockford area.

Arthur Pearson is the former director of the Chicago Program for the Gaylord and Dorothy Donnelley Foundation, where he oversaw the Foundation's investments in land conservation. He has written about conservation issues for numerous publications, agencies, and nonprofit groups. He is a regular contributor to the Center for Humans and Nature's *City Creatures* blog and his own blog about his volunteer restoration efforts at Midewin National Tallgrass Prairie.

Earlier this year, *Force of Nature* won an Outstanding Achievement Award for Scholarly Publications from the Illinois State Historical Society. Arthur will bring copies of the book to sell and sign. The books retail for \$26.95, but he will be selling them for an even \$20 – a special discount for those attending our Wild Ones meeting.

coordinators, and committee members who are leaving their positions, as well as to welcome the folks who will be joining us in leadership roles.

- Facebook. After several years of service, Marilyn Heneghan is passing the baton on maintaining our Facebook page. Her efforts helped expose the chapter to a new audience who might not have otherwise heard of us. This role will be taken on by Sallie Krebs, another social media wizard.
- Woodland plant sale. Jane Evans worked tirelessly to procure native woodland plants from several nurseries, travelling far and wide to be sure that orders could be filled. She also spearheaded our involvement at the Klehm Garden Fair and Nicholas Conservatory, increasing our exposure in the community. The woodland sale will continue to be combined with the prairie plant sale in spring 2019, so Cynthia Chmell and Bobbie Lambiotte will be responsible for both woodland and prairie plants going forward.
- Program committee. Ellen Rathbone and Ed Cope will be rolling off the committee. Their contacts and knowledge of educational topics and presenters has greatly benefitted the chapter, and we thank them for their efforts. The committee is still looking for a few new members (see elsewhere in this newsletter). Continuing on the committee will be Jerry Paulson and Lisa Johnson (chair), whose hard work is also noted and appreciated.
- *Publicity*. Due to family and travel commitments, Fiona Fordyce has passed the task of coordinating publicity to Joyce and

John Mori. We thank Fiona for her hard work (which we know has borne fruit because nonmembers at our educational programs tell us that they have heard about our events through various newspapers and other media outlets). Welcome aboard, Moris!

- Mentors. Mary Christian is thanked for her coordination of the mentor program in 2018. This program allows newcomers to natural landscaping to benefit from the knowledge and support of more experienced members. We are still looking for someone to assume this role in 2019 (see elsewhere in this newsletter).
- Volunteers. Don Heneghan has done an amazing job of lining up volunteers for many chapter events and monthly educational programs throughout the year. Very hearty thanks to Deb Rogers for her hard work as chapter treasurer. The chapter benefitted from her being so well organized and having an aptitude for dealing with numbers. Finally, *thank you to all who volunteered at our chapter's events* in 2018: at the plant and tree sales; mailing the newsletter (Janaan Lewis), providing graphic design skills to make our sale brochures look so professional, staffing the booth at community events, writing recaps of our meetings for the newsletter, serving as mentors for newer members, taking photos and bringing refreshments to meetings, serving as greeters at meetings, hauling the sound system to meetings, helping with the library, and helping at the special events like the summer social and plant rescues. Some things to watch for in 2019:

- The *prairie and woodland plant sales* will continue to be combined into a single event.
 - Don't forget the *mini-grant program* that allows folks to purchase plants at cost for

things like public restoration projects (e.g., Master Naturalist), school gardens, etc. For more information, contact Kim Lowman Vollmer (contact info on the last page of this newsletter). There is an application process, and the sale coordinators need to be sure that there are enough plants for both orders and mini-grants.

- *Plant shares* will likely continue to be curtailed due to the arrival of the Asian jumping worm in our area. We hosted a speaker on this topic in 2018. Sadly, we will be hearing about this destructive worm more and more going forward, as it has a devastating effect on native plant communities.
- Merchandise will no longer be brought to every meeting, although Cynthia will still be the keeper of the merchandise. The new procedure is that there will be a blurb in the newsletter every month, listing what merchandise is available. If you would like to purchase merchandise, you can contact Cynthia and we will be sure that the merchandise is brought to the next meeting for you (or other arrangements are made for a hand-off).
 - Wild Ones merchandise: We no longer receive a discount and also must now pay shipping. If you would like to purchase Wild Ones merchandise for yourself, this can be done through the national website or the national office. The chapter will not be ordering any new Wild Ones merchandise to sell.

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Recap November Potluck and Seed Exchange Constance McCarthy

First, many thanks to Bob Arevalo for arranging things at the location of this year's event at the Unitarian Universalist Church in Rockford, and for arriving early to get everything set up (and staying late to clean up). Another hearty thank-you goes to Sallie Krebs for pulling together a lovely slide show of photos from chapter events throughout the year. The slide show played on a continuous loop before and during the meal, and it really captured well the great things our chapter is doing for the community and the environment.

As always seems to be the case at our chapter's events, we had a delicious meal. The entrée was provided by the chapter, and folks brought a dish to share (appetizer, side dish, or dessert). Thanks to Mark Luthin for delivering the evening's entrée.

Before the seeds started flying at the very large table during the seed exchange, the chapter president gave a presentation on the chapter's notable events and accomplishments in 2018, including the following:

- We held a *board retreat* during January to discuss new ideas and make plans for the future
- There were nine excellent presentations at our *monthly educational meetings* at Rock Valley College by experts in their fields. At those meetings, we serve refreshments, merchandise is sold to support the chapter, and the library is made available for members. The booth is often set up and literature is offered to attendees.
- We had three very successful *plant sales*: Woodland, Prairie, and Tree and Shrub. This was the first year that the prairie and woodland sales were combined into one large sale. Plants were also sold at Nicholas Conservatory, BirdFest, and the Klehm Garden Fair. The proceeds from those sales are largely what allows the chapter to bring in top-notch speakers, pay for our meeting space, publish and distribute the newsletter, maintain our website, and add books to our library, among other things.

- Our *display booth* made an appearance at several outside events this year which improves awareness and name recognition for our chapter among the general public. One new event this year was OctoBird Fest at Rock Valley Garden Center.
- Headed up by Ginnie Watson, our chapter participated in *Nature Fiesta* in May at Blackhawk Springs Forest Preserve. This bilingual event is targeted at the Hispanic community. We offered activities for children and sold native plants.
- We had an *evening social* at the Holstrum's home, featuring a delicious potluck, followed by a tour of their restored prairie (loaded with native forbs, trees, and shrubs). It was a night of reconnecting with old members, meeting new folks, and perfect weather (not too hot, nice breeze, no rain).
- There was a *plant rescue* at the home of member Janet Giesen in Sycamore in October.
- We celebrated the year with our annual *potluck and seed exchange*!
- Six *board meetings* were attended by your dedicated and hardworking board members. Numerous coordinators also attended.
- Our *memberships* are holding steady at around 215 households, including 9 lifetime

URGENT: Board, Coordinator, and Committee Positions Still Open

We are a volunteer organization and, as such, rely on chapter members to step up to lead various undertakings by the chapter. Volunteers are the lifeblood of the chapter, and we are especially grateful to those who take the extra step to join the board, become a coordinator, or join a committee. Would you please consider joining us for 2019? There are detailed instructions (a "roadmap") for each position, and no one will be thrown into the deep end and left to fend for himself/herself. We are a friendly bunch, your board and coordinators (as well as the program committee), and would love to have you join us!

The following positions remain open for 2019 and need to be filled as soon as possible:

- *Treasurer.* This board member keeps the chapter's financial records and uses the chapter's checking account to reimburse expenses and pay various bills. Board meetings are on the second Thursday of even-numbered months (February, April, June, August, October, and December), although of course an occasional absence is not a problem.
- *Mentors.* This person uses the results of our annual membership survey to match up volunteer mentors with the folks who are seeking a mentor. There are detailed instructions and already prepared newsletter articles for you to submit. After doing the initial matching up of folks in the spring, the only other task is a little follow-up at the end of the growing season.
- Booth. Tim Lewis would like a co-coordinator to join him in the task of making arrangements for our chapter's display booth to appear at several non-Wild Ones events during the year (e.g., BirdFest). He is obviously experienced in this role and would be happy to show his future co-coordinator the ropes.
- *Volunteers*. Like the mentor coordinator, this person uses the results of the annual membership survey to line up volunteers for various chapter events throughout the year (plant sale, booth events, monthly meetings). This is done by email and by making phone calls. You're not left to scour the membership roster for this task; folks indicate on the annual survey the events where they are interested in volunteering.
- *Program committee.* This group plans the topics and organizes the speakers for our monthly educational programs at Rock Valley College. This friendly group is looking for a few new members.
