At our board meeting on the second Thursday of April, we will have to meet via Zoom, Go-To-Meeting, or some other online platform, as the stay-at-home order will most likely still be in place then. One of the topics we will surely discuss is planning for the contingency of not being able to host an in-person monthly educational program. After all, who knows what May will bring? Or maybe things will settle down for a spell, only to flare up again,

leading to another stay-at-home order. Could we live-stream a presentation by the scheduled speaker via YouTube or some other platform? We need to have a Plan B in hand so that we can still work to achieve our mission: educating folks about native plants. If you have any suggestions or expertise in this area, please let me know.

Normally, the April meeting is when we really promote our chapter's plant sale. We also had plans to distribute promotional postcards to businesses and organizations all over the northern Illinois area. Current circumstances make these things much more challenging (if not impossible, with regard to the latter). Instead, we will have to count on our members to help us get the word out to friends, family, and those in your social networks. The plant sale is our chapter's main fundraiser for the whole year, and the money we raise is what allows us to bring in top-notch speakers, publish the newsletter, pay for our meeting space and refreshments, maintain our website, and many other things.

Citizen Science

Do you care about wildlife and want to do your part to ensure their survival? Well, you may be a future Citizen Scientist. Our Citizen Scientists are volunteers who monitor wildlife through one of our many projects. With just a little training, you could help us monitor bats with our high-tech bat detector, native bees through Beespotter, bluebird

nestboxes, tree phenology through Budburst, calling frogs through the Frog Survey, threatened grassland birds, and more!

City Nature Challenge

City Nature Challenge is an international effort to document wildlife across the globe. This year, more than 250 cities are getting their communities out in nature to observe wildlife using an app and website called iNaturalist. Severson Dells is excited to coordinate a team for Winnebago, Boone, DeKalb, Ogle, and Stephenson counties and hopes to host several events on the weekend of April 24-27, 2020. Grandparents Camp

The best place to make memories is out in nature. Bring a grandkid (or two or three) to our Grandparent's Camp at Severson Dells. We will splash in the creek on July 1 and explore our prairies and forest on July 2. Each day will be packed with hands-on activities that will engage and inspire both you and your grandkid. You are welcome to sign up for one or both days of camp.

Restoration Workdays

Become a steward of the land by helping restore our natural habitat at Severson Dells Forest Preserve. We meet on the second Saturday and fourth Monday of each month from 9:00 a.m.-12:00 p.m. to remove invasive species, collect seed, and more. We provide snacks, water, tools, and PPE. All you have to do is show up!

Wildflower Walks

Severson Dells Nature Center and the Natural Land Institute have created a series of wildflower hikes at stunning natural areas across Northern Illinois. Each hike is led by a local expert and focuses on a particular group of plants, whether it be spring ephemerals, wooly milkweed, or coneflower. The hikes run for about an hour and take place from late April to the end of June.

Native Plant Sale Update

My goodness, how things have changed since I wrote the plant sale update for the March newsletter!

First and foremost: yes, the plant sale will take place this year! The sale brochure will be distributed in early April, and advance orders will be due on Friday, May 1. If you are interested in choosing plants for a rain garden, butterfly garden, or pollinator garden, or to attract birds (including hummingbirds), guidance will be provided regarding which plants we are offering, will be the best for your desired purpose.

However, current circumstances will most likely cause us to have to make some changes in the way the sale has always taken place.

If there continues to be a stay-at-home order on the days on which the order pick-up and public sale are to take place (Thursday through Saturday, May 7-9), we will figure out a way to do curbside pick-up at the Paulson farm that will allow for everyone to maintain required social distancing. Modifications may have to be made to how we conduct the in-person sale. Perhaps a list of available plants will be made available very near to the pick-up dates, and folks can let us know which additional plants they would like to purchase; again, those plants could be packaged for curbside pick-up at the Paulson farm.

We will not know more precise details until the days of the pick-up and public sale draw closer.

We had plans to sell plants at non-Wild Ones events, as this has been especially profitable for us in the past and allowed us to get the word out about Wild Ones. These events were to tentatively include: Nicholas Conservatory (early May), Sand Bluff Bird Observatory open house (Mother's Day weekend), Nature Fiesta (mid-May), and the Klehm Garden Fair (early June). We have not received word regarding whether any/all of these will still take place; I'm sure that even the organizers of these events don't know at the moment. So much depends on factors entirely outside any of our control. We will just have to roll with the punches; if the events happen, we will be there, and if not, we won't. Yet again, updates will be provided as soon as we have information to share.

Thanks in advance to everyone for your flexibility during these challenging times. With everyone's help, we will be able to get the word out far and wide about the sale, all for the benefit of our chapter.
